Top 10 Most Wanted Yard Birds - A Christmas Bird Count Primer

It's Christmas Bird Count season! Ventura's count is Saturday, December 21st. That means it's time to start checking those backyard birds! This presentation will focus on the history of the Christmas Bird Count, the importance of community science, how you can participate in our upcoming count, and what birds to look for in your yard. We will also take a look at some local trends that we've observed over the past 45 years. Finally, we'll go over the birds that we most want to find for the CBC. You may have one and not even realize it!




Ventura Audubon Christmas Bird Count Saturday December 21st, 2024

Ventura Count Circle

Each winter the Christmas Bird Count (CBC) is a chance to participate in the oldest and longest running community science project. Click here for information from National Audubon on the history of the CBC, and here for reports from 1900-present.

Each Audubon chapter counts a 15-mile diameter "count circle". The same circle is counted each year for consistency. The Ventura Audubon count circle is subdivided into 8 sectors (see map to the right). Each sector has a leader who organizes teams within their sector, and the entire circle is organized by our CBC coordinator and compiler, Frank DeMartino. Frank will report the data after the count is completed to the National Audubon Society database.

What are we learning from the CBC?

Each year CBC data is added to a database and is available to researchers and the public. The Ventura count has been held each year since 1980. Brad Sillasen created an interactive database that shows trends in bird populations within Ventura Audubon's Count Circle. Below is an overview of the data we have collected. Christmas Bird Count

Saturday Dec 21st, 2023 Meeting Time: Check with your sector leader

Today we count all species, numbers of birds of species and we visit every nook and cranny in our Ventura Audubon count circle. Birders of all skill sets are involved in the CBC. If you are a beginning birder, our coordinator will pair you with an expert.

If your home is within the boundaries of a CBC circle, then you can stay at home and report the birds that visit your feeder on count day as long as you have made prior arrangement with our count compiler.

Ventura Wildlife Ponds Tree Swallow Nest Box Project

boxes at the Ventura settling ponds have been attractive to cavity-nesting Tree Swallows (Tachycineta bicolor) for decades. This last spring VAS volunteers built updated boxes and placed them in locations to better protect the birds and to encourage them to nest.

There were two waves of nest occupation by the swallows. The first arrived in April and the second in late May. Each pair marked their selected box with a few feathers and took a week or two to build a nest. Each nest ultimately contained 4-6 pale pink eggs. The parents incubate the eggs for about 2 weeks. It takes about 3



weeks for the chick to fledge from the time they've hatched.

We had three teams of two people rotating to check the boxes twice weekly, totaling 100 hours, and recording the data on the Cornell Lab NestWatch app. A total of nine broods were recorded, with 34 fledglings. The boxes have now been removed for repair and cleaning over the winter.

We'll be calling on volunteers next spring who might be available to help with nest box installation and monitoring in the spring. We look forward to expanding to twelve boxes and to continuing to learn about these amazing swallows.


Beginner Bird ID Winter Edition - Sunday, December 15th at 2pm on ZOOM
